

Foreword from Christine Taylor Mayor, West Bedlington Town Council

Where does the time go, another busy six months both on a personal and council front. I moved house, having lived in High Ridge for 18 years and I've downsized to a new home Hartford Crescent which is lovely and I think I'm going to like living there.

On the Council front we've been really busy with sourcing CCTV systems to help combat some of the anti-social behaviour we are being plagued with recently. After shortlisting two companies and receiving excellent presentations from both, we appointed Reay securities Ltd. We have been working with Andy and Simon from Reay to ensure we obtain the best coverage for our assets. We consulted the police and have been able to cover some major problem areas. I've written a short article within this Newsletter outlining where CCTV cameras will be located.

Grit bins, but spring is on the way... working with County Councillors Malcolm Robinson and Russ Wallace we have been able to provide several additional grit bins over the town. These are in place now ahead of next winter so you should be able to identify the new ones. Malcolm and Russ funded these from their small schemes allowance and we will pick up the tab for the replenishment as and when it's needed.

Speed Awareness Signs, again working with our County Councillors we are adding Speed Awareness Signs. We are currently in the process of purchasing signs for Nedderton Village which will be placed when entering the village from both sides. Hartford Home Farm, a forty mile an hour zone will receive two new ones as this is a busy stretch of road and we are hoping to reinforce the speed limit here. Again funding for these is from County councillors small schemes allowance and West Bedlington Town Council, we will also pick up the tab for their maintenance costs.

I recently attended the Northumberland Local Plan roadshow held in Bedlington Community Centre. While it was informative on what is going on in our County it was disappointing for some residents who thought it would provide them with an update on the Town Centre redevelopment, we were able to redirect them to the Local Area Committee Meeting held on 20th March at Netherton Social Club. I'm hopeful all our questions will be answered there.

Plans for a Neighbourhood Plan have been underway since I first joined the Council 7 years ago. It has been started and shelved on several occasions but recently we have made some good progress with the appointment of Jo-Anne Garrick as our plan developer. We intend to hold an open forum as part of our Meeting of the Town on Wednesday 17th April so please come along if you can; additional details are contained within the Newsletter.

Events: following on from last year's events we are proposing to hold a 2 day summer event on 20 Acres playing fields, flyers are already circulating; a Spooktacular in conjunction with Bedlington Cricket Club on the 2nd November and our Christmas light switch on the 30th November; complete with ice skating, carols and craft fair.

We have invested some funding into providing activities for our younger residents throughout the school holidays. We have a wide range of activities including Football, Golf, Glass painting and den building with Footprints on the Moon at Plessy Woods. There are also additional activities with the Family Gateway and a full itinerary is contained in the Newsletter.

Finally, I hope you enjoy this Newsletter. We try and include as much variety as possible, however, if you have any suggestions or something you would like to include please forward it to westbedlingtontowncouncil@gmail.com

Protecting Our Assets

Following a number of discussions, research by Steven our Town Clerk and presentations to the Services committee, we appointed Reay Security Ltd as our service provider for CCTV for our town.

The purpose of CCTV is to record incidents of vandalism/hooliganism to council property, provide security to members of the public and potentially provide evidence to the authorities as requested.

We are proposing to install up to 9 stand alone CCTV surveillance systems in the following locations:

- Meadowdale Play Park/Black Path
- West Lea Play Park/Red Ash Path
- Red Lion Roundabout/Subway
- Front Street West/TSB
- Market Square
- Morrisons roundabout/Chahals shop/Black Path

We have worked with police and Reay Security to identify known troubled areas and are focusing on these first but we have the flexibility to move or add cameras if and when needed. We are hoping the introduction of CCTV into the town will act as a deterrent to the mindless damage we are suffering from at the moment and help in protecting our assets.

We as a Town Council will not have access to the recording as the system is being totally managed by Reay Security so it will not be possible to request images unless it's to support a criminal prosecution and it is requested via the Police for prosecutions. This supports the new GDPR policy and as a Town council we fully support this approach.

Our town looks fabulous all the time but I particularly love our tree lights and lamp post decorations during the festive season so if you see anyone either damaging them or helping themselves please report it to the Police.

West Bedlington Town Council Youth Leisure Provision

For some time The Council has been aware of a need within the Town to provide events / activities for our younger residents during school holidays.

The Council has no direct resources of its own to call upon and is therefore indebted to event / activity providers to help fulfil this requirement. In the previous and current financial year the Council has made available funding of £22,500 to help fulfil this need.

Last year's events and activities included football coaching, golf lessons, den building and woodland crafts, arts and crafts workshops, glass decoration classes and play activities. We are looking to repeat and in some cases extend the number of events / activities available this year.

Additionally we are hoping to provide BMX and Skateboard demonstrations and will look to trial a shuttle bus to allow swimmers to travel to Ashington Leisure Centre - both projects are at an early stage but once details have been agreed we will advertise them widely within the community. Please check out the details of the already agreed activities



and events in this newsletter, remember in some cases places are limited so please ensure you book or fulfil the requirement of the event / activity provider (details are within each advertisement).

Finally if as a resident, parent or community group member you are aware of any event / activity providers who would be interested in proving the same for our younger residents during school holiday periods please in the first instance please ask them to contact the Council for an informal discussion.

Exciting developments planned for Gallagher Park!

Gallagher Park, right in the heart of our town, is a fantastic place for all of the community but we want to make it even better by improving the park's play facilities.

For those of you who have visited the park you will know that the current equipment is less than ideal and we are working collaboratively with partners to help change this.

Northumberland County Council have agreed to provide some funding towards a new play area. Bill Crosby and Russ Wallace, 2 of our local Councillors. have also contributed £5,000 each towards

the funds and Friends of Gallagher Park have donated £2,000 as well. This gives us a really good basis to start building a play park that meets the needs of our children. However, we want to make the park even more attractive to visitors and as wide a range of children as possible and we are looking to additionally fund the purchase of a bespoke piece of equipment which will help channel our children's inquisitiveness, sense of adventure and celebrate our local heritage.

We need your help. Friends of Gallagher Park are seeking to raise £32,000 to purchase and install a bespoke play equipment, something like the train pictured here. We have set

up a Crowd Funding page (www.gofundme.com/ play-park-at-gallagher-park or check out our website for the link) and need the support of the community in raising these funds to help turn our ambition into a reality. A train or something similar is ideal to celebrate our town's rail heritage as the first railway tracks were built here in Bedlington and forged from the old Iron Works at Furnace Bank.

Gallagher Park was created in the mid-1980s following the reclamation of the former colliery sites of Dr Pit and Bedlington A Pit. The park has football pitches, a BMX track, wonderful walking trails and fantastic views to name just a few of its assets.


Friends of Gallagher Park are a non-profit organisation ran by volunteers to help improve and promote

the park. We organise litter picks, have funded park benches and the information boards that have recently been installed in the park. We are also about to plant wildflowers in the park to further enhance the beauty and support local wildlife. Bedlington Man Remembered...

Thanks to the efforts of West Bedlington Town Council, the name of Bedlington soldier, John Shotton, will soon appear on the war memorial in Front Street... a century after he was killed!

Born at Choppington, John lived at Netherton Colliery and then at 7 Third Street in Bedlington. He was a big man, standing over 6 feet tall and presumably he was a strong man for he worked initially as a miner in Netherton Colliery and then served as a Police Constable with Northumberland Constabulary.

In December 1915 John enlisted in the Army and was posted into the Life Guards with whom he went to the battlefields of France. He fought in



the trenches for almost three years, transferring at some stage to the Irish Guards, and he was killed in action on 20thOctober, 1918 – just three weeks before the end of the war. John is buried in Vertain Communal Cemetery in Northern France.

John Shotton was obviously a brave man. He faced danger throughout his adult life, as a miner, as a policeman and as a soldier in the First World War. A true son of Bedlingtonshire who deserves to be remembered.

Town Twinning: Wansbeck - Schalksmuhle Friendship Society

12th October 2018, Eighteen guests from our twin town of Schalksmuhle, in North Rhine Westfalia, Germany were welcomed.

After a tour of Wales, our friends from Schalksmuhle arrived in Bedlington, members of our friendship group were at the Golf Club to welcome them, along with the Mayor of West Bedlington Town Council Christine Taylor. There were 18 visitors from Schalksmuhle which as readers may recall has been twinned with Bedlington and Wansbeck area now since 1970.

We didn't give them much chance to recover however as our programme for their visit started 9.30 next day when we all travelled by coach to Kelso and a visit to Floors Castle. From there we travelled to Boulmer, for a traditional fish and chip meal at the Fishing Boat Inn. The day was filled with renewing old friendships, making new ones and some of our newer members had the opportunity to

experience twinning in action for the first time.

Next day, Sunday, we again boarded the coach and travelled via coast through Whitley Bay and Tynemouth, we learnt a lot of the history of our region courtesy of a German speaking quide who then took us on a walking tour of Newcastle highlighting the cultural, industrial and historical side of the City. After lunch we then travelled to the Royal Northumberland Yacht Club in Blyth for an evening of music, by North Tyne Accoustic, and a Buffet meal. The day was interesting and educational and the evening turned out to be a great success sharing it all with old friends, music, good food, and wine.

By this time it was Monday and we all had a free day to spend with our guests, this was followed by our Farewell Party, which traditionally is a Ceilidh and buffet with short speeches and present exchanges from the Chair of our Friendship Society and the Schalksmuhle Chair of their Friendship Society.

This celebration was held in East Bedlington Community Centre also on this occasion some of our local Councillors and the Chair of East Bedlington Parish Council, Keith Grimes expressed their pleasure at meeting our visitors from Schalksmuhle. The Ceilidh was, as usual, a big success and the excellent caller managed to successfully direct the dancing and encouraged us all to participate in a very lively Ceilidh.

Since this successful visit we have had press reports from Schalksmuhle describing the long friendship between our two regions and in particular this latest visit.

Our group are planning a return visit to Germany in 2020, in the meantime the Schalksmuhle-Wansbeck Friendship Society meet every other month at Netherton Social Club, should you be interested in learning more, no obligation, please ring Muriel Thompson, secretary on 01670 820511 for further information. There is no requirement to speak German, so language isn't an obstacle.

The Society would like to thank both West Bedlington Town Council and East Bedlington Parish Council for their support.

New Play Area - 20 Acre Playing Field

Following representation from local residents West Bedlington Town Council is working towards the provision of a new play area for younger children on the 20 Acre Playing Field.

This bold new project will look to provide an exciting and inclusive environment for our younger residents (under 12 years of age) whilst encouraging and supporting learning through play. The new equipment will be inclusive and provide

scope for disabled members of the community to use and enjoy.

The play equipment specification will aim to promote the following play uses – Swinging, Sliding, Climbing, Bouncing, Balancing, and Spinning and will include the installation of appropriate safety surfaces.

Alongside the new play equipment the Council also intends to reinstate the mini football posts and pitch that have recently been removed by the County Council. The intention of the project will be to enclose the newly installed mini football posts and pitch with a fence to prevent entry by dogs.

The timescale for the completion is still uncertain



a number of issues are still to be resolved, primarily planning approval needs to obtained, but the Council hopes that, all being well, the project could be completed ahead of the summer school holidays.

The Council has already obtained some funding to assist with the cost of the project and County

Councillor Russ Wallace has indicated that he would also like to contribute financially from The County Council's member's small claims scheme.


Please see the plan above as an indication of where the proposed play area and mini football pitch will be situated.

The future development of Bedlington (Consultation)

The Council would like to place on record its gratitude and thanks to those residents and organisations who returned our initial consultation relating to the development of a Neighbourhood Plan for West Bedlington.

Although the number of returns was disappointing the quality of those returned was very high and very useful in informing the Council of the concerns and aspirations of residents.

We are about to embark on the next stage in the consultancy process and would encourage all residents to play their part. Details of what happens next and how you can get involved in The Neighbourhood Plan are detailed on the next page.

West Bedlington Neighbourhood Plan

We need your views to help is shape the future of your Parish!

West Bedlington Town Council is leading the preparation of a neighbourhood plan for the area.

What is a neighbourhood plan?

The opportunity for local communities to prepare a neighbourhood plan was introduced in 2011. It enables people living and working in an area to guide where and how future development happens. Neighbourhood plans are prepared by the local communities through their town and parish councils, rather than being prepared by Northumberland County Council.

The West Bedlington Neighbourhood Plan will be used to make decisions on planning applications, giving it genuine influence on the future of our area. Plans can include a range of policies, including those which:

- guide new development;
- conserve and enhance the environment: and
- support the provision of community facilities.

Plans can also include community actions, which could be delivered by the town council as well as other local groups and organisations.

What has happened so far?

Following a number of periods of early engagement on issues for the West Bedlington Neighbourhood Plan, the town council has prepared a draft vision and objectives for the plan and are now seeking the views of the local community and other stakeholders.

How can I get involved?

The draft vision and objectives for the neighbourhood plan are included in this article. It also provides information on the types of planning policies and other issues the neighbourhood plan could look to address

The town council is launching this next round of community engagement on the plan at the Annual Meeting of the Town on Wednesday, 17 April 2019 between 6pm and 8pm. The launch event is to be held at Bedlington Community Centre, Front Street West, Bedlington, NE22 5TT. It is a drop-in event so you can come along at any point during the 2 hours.

If you can't come along, please have a look at the town council's website and Facebook page which will contain details of all of the information displayed after the event.

Your feedback will be used to help inform the preparation of a draft neighbourhood plan, the town council therefore need comments to be sent back by Wednesday 1st May 2019.

Draft vision

The draft vision sets out what the West Bedlington Neighbourhood Plan intends to achieve over the plan period to 2036, it will inform all of the draft policies and community actions contained within the emerging plan.

By 2036 West Bedlington will comprise a sustainable and cohesive community. There will be an appreciation of the importance of the heritage of the area, which is vital to its sense of place, as well as giving local communities a sense of belonging.

Improvements will have been made to the local environment, employment opportunities, services and facilities which will enhance the quality of life of residents. Communities will be well-connected, via sustainable transport routes to major employment opportunities as well as and greater services and facilities beyond the plan area.

The important environmental and historic character of the area will have been maintained and enhanced by ensuring new development is of an appropriate scale and design, as well as reflecting the rural setting of the plan area. Important green spaces will be protected for the benefit of future generations.

Draft objectives

To deliver the vision, four draft objectives have been developed. The objectives clearly relate to the issues identified through early engagement. The draft planning policies and community actions contained within the plan will deliver the objectives.

Objective 1 - Quality of life

Ensuring new development is sustainable, contributes positively to the built, historic and natural environment of the plan area. New development will achieve a balance between development and protecting important green spaces.

Objective 2 - Community well-being

Building on the strong sense of community across the plan area and recognising the diverse needs of existing and future residents. Supporting the provision of different types of housing that people can afford and meet identified needs, including those of an ageing population. Ensuring the local community have access to the services and facilities they need.

Objective 3 - Local economy

Supporting both existing and the creation of new employment opportunities across the plan area, as well as protecting and enhancing the vitality and viability of the town centre.

Objective 4 - Accessibility

Promoting access to sustainable modes of transport, to connect local communities to the services and facilities which they require. Whilst ensuring the environmental quality of the plan area is protected by effectively managing traffic.

Draft planning policy themes

Draft areas for potential planning policies have been identified under each of the relevant objectives.

Quality of life

Sustainable development:

- Overarching policy setting out what the presumption in favour of sustainable development means within the plan area;
- Promoting good quality design in new development to ensure new development reflects the character, scale, layout, mass, materials etc of the area;
- Manage the location of new development and identify what development can take place in the open countryside.

Natural environment:

- Protecting/ enhancing green infrastructure assets;
- Protecting/ enhancing biodiversity;
- Identification of areas of local green space and protected open space.

Built and historic environment:

- · Listed buildings;
- Conservation Area.

Community well-being

Housing:

- Supporting infill development within the settlement boundary;
- Rural exceptions site policy To identify when development could take place outside the settlement boundary

Community services and facilities:

· Protection and enhancement of community services and facilities

Local economy

- · Support for employment development;
- Enhancing the vitality and viability of the town centre.

Accessibility

- Active travel routes Routes used by pedestrians, cyclists and horse riders. They can include established pathways and cycle routes, public rights of way, bridle paths and paths of a more informal nature;
- · Transport and new developments.

Draft community action themes

- Town enhancements;
- Opportunities to enhance access to leisure facilities
- Supporting existing local projects;
- Provision of facilities for older and younger people;
- Walking opportunities e.g. heritage walks/ health walks and improvements to existing paths;
- Public toilets.

In addition to the provision of new bins a significant number of old damaged or unfit for use bins have been replaced. A spate of vandalism resulted in the need to replace several others. All of which adds to the overall cost to residents for this locally important service.

West Bedlington Town Council is committed to providing the best possible litter bins it can for the use of diligent residents and visitors. To that end, The Council has been investigating a number of different types of litter bin to find the best balance between cost, durability and aesthetics. The intention is to replace existing bins with a new type of bin as and when a need for a replacement is required.

The new bin type will be more durable, though a little more costly than the existing bin type in the hope that they will be more vandal resistant and offer a longer life span.

Whilst West Bedlington Town Council is responsible for the provision, repair and replacement of litter bins throughout the Parish, the responsibility to empty those bins is Northumberland County Council's alone. Residents will no doubt already be aware of some of pressures both financial and shortage of resources the County Council is facing. This is also true of resources to empty litter bins throughout the parish (and others).

The Town Council provides 165 litter bins throughout the town / parish. Following discussions with The County Council's Neighbourhood Services Team the Town Council





has been informed that the County Council has now reached its maximum capacity with regard to emptying litter bins in West Bedlington.

What does that mean to residents and the Town Council in relation to requesting the replacement of existing or the provision of new additional litter bins? The Town Council is committed to maintaining its existing litter bins in the best possible condition they can be, so will always look to replace / repair any existing litter bin. The Town Council will also try to look favourably upon requests for any new additional bins where a need for one is demonstrated, however it must ensure that Northumberland County Council is able to empty any new bin. With the County Council already at its maximum capacity for this service the Town Council will have no other alternative but to rationalise the provision of any new bin (where a need is demonstrated) by replacing underused bin elsewhere in the town

The Town Council will in conjunction with Northumberland County Council's Neighbourhood Services Team endeavour to identify underused bins which could potentially be relocated in the future should any demand elsewhere be identified. The Council would be interested to hear from residents if they can identify any existing litter bins that are either not used or used little or perhaps there are more bins in a specific location than is needed. COMMUNITY CHEST GRANTS

West Bedlington Town
Council has a 'Community
Chest' scheme which gives
local voluntary groups and
organisations a chance to bid
for funding.

This might be to help establish a new group or to carry out extra activities that they wouldn't otherwise be able to do - e.g. sporting activities, arts, music or craft group, new equipment for a youth club - but these ideas will be coming from the community themselves.

To qualify for an award the applicant must be able to demonstrate clearly

that any funding from West Bedlington Town Council will benefit the Town, or residents of the Town.

Grant applications will be dealt with by the Full Council. In determining the validity of an application, the Council will refer to the following guidelines:

Applications will be considered for the following purposes:

- 1. For the purpose of purchasing equipment or materials either in part or in full.
- 2. For the purchase of services e.g. venue hire or transport that will enable group members to partake in a group trip or outing regardless of their incomes.

- 3. For running costs (but not wages) of a viable group that is experiencing a period of hardship.
- 4. For the provision of recreational activities and facilities.
- 5. For activities that raise the profile of the area.



The work to give us a brand new play area at Plessey Woods has started and should be ready for Easter. Happy to pay for one of the new bus shelters along Schalksmuhle road so residents and shoppers can get out of the weather when waiting for their buses.

Interesting meeting with some of our young people as part of the Democracy Week, great questions! Both main road entrances into the town which are in my ward have been resurfaced as well as many sections repaired.

Main road footpath and fencing adjacent to the Green Letch have been done. At last the lights have been repaired heading up to Netherton Village. New grit bins in place where residents asked for them.

Upgrades agreed on both the A1068 and the B1331. So some of the smaller things residents asked for and we needed in the ward.

on a Monday morning to
DV8 youth club, Messy
Church or Family Film Club
on a Friday evening.

Some of our programme operates on a membership basis to allow control of numbers for health and safety reasons, but most sessions are open to everyone.

Parent & Toddlers have 3 sessions a week; Monday, Wednesday and Friday mornings from 9.15am. Groups are relaxed and friendly and run in accordance with EYFS guidelines in order to prepare the little ones for nursery and beyond. Please call for details.

The Monday afternoon ladies' group (Home League) is our meeting for ladies of all ages and offers a varied programme including guest speakers and afternoon outings. They meet between 2.00 and 3.00pm and everyone is welcome to come along and join in.

Our Lunch Club on a Wednesday serves up to 56 members with a main course, sweet and tea/coffee at 12.15pm. The cost for the meal is £3.50...the fellowship and friendly atmosphere is free!

The Over 60s group meet immediately after Lunch Club until 2.30pm. It is a relaxed meeting for both men and women with interesting talks, songs and fellowship and is open to anyone over 60.

Games Club play pool, dominoes and other games on a Wednesday afternoon. Again, this follows straight after Lunch Club and runs until 2.30pm. This is a free session and is open to everyone.

Age UK run a Chair Based Exercise session on a Wednesday afternoon from 2.30 until 3.30pm. Exercises are gentle and as the title suggests performed sitting down. Eileen welcomes anybody of any age.

CAMEO (Come and Meet Each Other) meet every other Thursday (2nd & 4th Thursday of each month) between 2.00 and 4.00pm. Members bring their handicrafts and share fellowship over tea/coffee and biscuits.

The Soup Spot on a Friday offers lunch to anyone who cares to drop in. We serve fresh, homemade soup with a roll followed by a pudding or a scone with a cup of tea or coffee. All we ask is for a minimum donation of £2 to cover our costs. Soup is served from around 11.45am until 1pm.

Straight after Soup Spot we have the Afternoon Film. Beginning at 1pm this is aimed at adults and our regular attenders enjoy the company as much as the show. Entry is free (but we never refuse a donation!).

Friday evenings vary. Two weeks of the month are DV8 Junior Club. This is open to children from Year 2 to Year 6 and offers a variety of games, events and outings. Children can be left with us from 6.00pm and must be collected by an adult at 7.30pm.

In between the DV8 weeks is Family

Film Club. A new, recent or classic children's film on the big screen at 5.30pm. The atmosphere is relaxed and we welcome families with children of any age. Entry is free. All we ask is that you buy your snacks (hot dogs, popcorn, chocolate & drinks) from us and don't bring your own. All items are 50p each. It helps cover our overheads and keeps the maths simple!

The last Friday of each month is Messy Church. Activities begin at 6.00pm with crafts and carry on with songs and games followed by a shared meal. This free session is open to all families who would like to join in. Children must be accompanied by a parent/guardian.

Sunday services are at 10.00am and 5.30pm. We have a mixture of worship styles, enhanced by contributions from both the children's and adult's choirs and brass bands. We pray, read Scripture, listen to Biblical teaching and respond to God's message. Morning worship includes our vibrant Sunday School for children. You are very welcome to join us and stay for refreshments after both services.

Wherever we do have to charge for activities the cost is kept to a minimum in order to keep the programme running, but no profit is made.

Our Food Bank supports local people in need with a 3-day emergency food parcel. We take referrals from several agencies such as Social Services, schools. Probation Service or the police. Our main referrer is NETS which can be accessed by anyone for assistance when they are in need. We accept donations of food whenever the centre is open and rely on the goodwill of the public and our congregation to be able to continue to offer this service. A food parcel will contain breakfast. lunch and dinner for each person in the household for three days. A typical bag will have cereal, UHT milk, soup/ beans/noodles and tinned meat with tinned vegetables, pasta with sauce and rice with an accompaniment. If possible, we include tea/coffee, tinned puddings, biscuits and toiletries.

Anyone who would like information on any part of our programme please drop into the centre or give us a ring on 01670 829356. The office is usually open Monday to Friday between 8.00am and 4.00pm except Thursdays when times may vary.

Volunteers Needed -Do your bit and become a Defibrillator Guardian

A guardian is a loyal, responsible person who volunteers to carry out a regular cabinet and defibrillator inspection.

The inspection is non-technical and can be carried out without accessing the inside of the cabinet. A simple report of each inspection is completed and returned to the Ambulance Service via the Town Council office and this confirms to the Ambulance Service whether or not a defibrillator is operational.

Inspections should be carried out once a week, at any time convenient to yourself. All forms to report the inspection will be provided by the Town Council.

Throughout the country thousands

of guardians carry out regular checks. It is possible to have more than one guardian per cabinet to share the responsibility and time commitment.

This valuable service provides information ensuring high levels of governance are maintained and the Ambulance Service continue to offer instructions when a member of the public reports an emergency. Without the support of loyal guardians, many Public Access Defibrillators sites and initiatives would not be possible to operate.

Services Provided by West Bedlington Town Council

West Bedlington Town Council - 2019/20 Budget and Council Tax Charges

Your total Council Tax Bill (issued by Northumberland County Council) is made up of a number of different elements – Northumberland County Council (for the services provided by The County Council), The Police Authority (to help fund Policing), The Fire Authority (to help fund Fire and Rescue Services), Adult Social Care (to contribute towards the cost of adult social care) and finally your Town Council precept (to help fund the services funded by West Bedlington Town Council).

Some of the main services are shown in the panel opposite.

The Council has for the forthcoming year (2019 /200 resolved to increase its own annual budget from £242,297 to £246,995 – a summary of the various elements of the budget are shown below. In making this decision the Council has taken into account an estimated increase in the parish's Council Tax Base (simplified as been the total number of dwellings and the estimated charges for each of those dwellings). And in doing so has produced an increase in its available spending power without increasing the payment burden upon individual households. Effectively the increase in the Council Tax base and The Councils budget mirror each other resulting in no increase in the payment of the element of your Council Tax Bill attributed to West Bedlington Town Council and the provision of its services. Please note your Council Tax payment will increase if there has been any increase in any of the other elements that make up your overall Council Tax Bill, which are of course not within the control of West Bedlington Town Council.

West Bedlington Town Council is committed to delivering high quality, value for money services that do not overburden its residents financially through progressive and continuous year on year Council Tax increases.

The Council is in a strong financial position and has some reserves to call upon should they be needed to finance unexpected or new expenditure. The Council has no borrowing and no debt to repay and is obliged to restricting spending to remain within its own affordable financial controls and thus protect its residents from any undue Council Tax increases, wherever possible.

A summary of the budget for 2019/20 is shown on the previous page.

TOWN COUNCIL MEETINGS

You can attend Town Council meetings (usually the second Thursday of the month at Bedlington Community Centre at 6:30pm)

Before each Town Council meeting there will be a 15 minute open Session. The Chair will invite members of the public present to put questions to, or draw relevant matters to the attention of the Council prior to commencement of business. In order to give every member of the public a fair chance of asking a question, each person will be limited to two questions at each session and each question is limited to 3 minutes per person.
