Welcome to our second Newsletter of the year, it's been a busy first six months with plenty going on.

Firstly I would like to talk about the recent by-election, because there has been speculation and numerous rumours about it. The facts are a vacancy on the Town Council arose during its term, vacancies of this kind are normally but not always filled via a process called co-option. However, on this occasion ten local residents exercised their democratic right to request a by-election. A co-option is where The Council advertise a vacancy and people who live within the surrounding vicinity put in an application to fill that post, the full council would normally carry out an informal interview and if they are lucky enough to get more than one candidate The Council members will then vote and the successful candidate joins The Council, simple and straightforward and at minimal cost to the town.


Following the departure of Councillor Kathleen Roach I thought that's what would happen, however ten local residents supported by a political party decided that they would like a by-election.

I was challenged for allowing Dawn Crosby to stand in the by-election (not my decision) and I have been accused of forcing the by-election by not allowing the political parties' candidate a free pass to take up the vacant seat (again not my decision). The by-election has now been concluded and in my opinion we have seen democracy in action, at the maximum cost to the Council Tax payers of the town. So on that note I would like to formally congratulate Councillor Dawn Crosby and welcome her to West Bedlington Town Council, there's lots to be done so you'll be very busy.

Finally, before I move on I would like to acknowledge Viv Mather, the other candidate who stood in the by-election. Having met Viv on several occasions I appreciate her interest and have issued an invitation should she wish to be involved in any of The Councils events, Neighbourhood Plan etc., our door is open.

Moving onto the old Tesco site, I'm disappointed at the lack of movement on the site, August has been and is long gone, September gave us an update but little in the way of movement, I've asked Russ Wallace the County Councillor for Bedlington Central to get some further info and get this out with fixed dates so we can see some activity sooner rather than later. At the time of going to press – work has commenced.

Summer Fair – we have had numerous comments about our summer fair this year from it was fantastic to I was totally disgusted! I'm not going to





defend our event, we tried something different, more activity based and less fairground to keep costs down for families but it would seem we still haven't quite got the formula right. We have taken a few lessons from this years and are looking towards next year's event and we are looking for volunteers to help with suggestions for formats etc., so if you have anything you would like to propose please get in touch with us at westbedlingtontowncouncil@gmail. com.

Other events coming up are Halloween, this year we are at the Cricket Club in Bedlington, on Saturday 3rd November, many thanks to them for their support. We are planning a ticket only event and have 800 free tickets which will be available from Vet's 4 Pets, the Post Office on the Front Street, the Cricket Club and the Community Centre. It will be a disco and fancy dress competition, apple bobbing ending with a small fireworks display to end the event.

Our Service of Remembrance will be held on Sunday 11th November, this is the centenary year and I was privileged to attend the service organised by St Cuthbert's Church in July. During this service a very moving tribute was paid by children from all over Bedlington following their visit to France to visit the war graves. We will have our own tributes in the Community Centre which will be available for viewing either prior to or following the Service of Remembrance.

Some of you will have previously seen the poppy map which identified the fallen from West Bedlington on an early version of our town map. Each of the fallen are depicted by a poppy which has been had stitched with their name. The original map was designed and produced in conjunction with Bedlington Creative's and in this centenary year they have produced a Second World War map depicting the fallen of our town and the Commonwealth War Cemeteries where they are currently interred.

We have seen our own service grow year on year and in this centenary year envisage a large turnout to enable us all to pay our respects.

Christmas is looming fast and we will be holding our Christmas lights switch on, on Saturday 1st December at 4 pm. During the day both St Cuthbert's Church and the Community Centre in Bedlington have Christmas Markets on so there will be plenty of activity on the street. Finally, I have some thanks and congratulations. Firstly thank you to Councillor Kathleen Roach for her contribution to the Town Council, we wish you well moving forward.

To all the partners we have worked with from events with Salto to those who provided summer activities, the Salvation Army, Bedlingtonshire Golf Club, Foot Prints on the Moon, Class on a Glass, and Bedlington FC.

And last but certainly not least congratulations to Councillor Victoria Thompson and her husband Glen on the safe arrival of Herbert Starman Thompson, he's a little peach, little brother to Fred and Henry, he's already made his debut at our Services meeting. There's nothing like starting them young!

As this is our last Newsletter before Christmas, I would like to wish all our residents and readers a very Merry Christmas and best wishes for 2019.

1914-1918 It started with a poem

Remembrance time is approaching and many, many people of all ages will be seen around the town wearing the traditional scarlet poppy. Perhaps there will be more poppies in evidence this year as we commemorate the 100th anniversary of the armistice which ended the First World War. But, although many people know the significance of the poppy, very few know how it originated as the symbol of remembrance.

Colonel John McCrae was a Canadian who had served In the Boer War and then became a doctor. In 1915 he was working in a Forward Dressing Station at Vlamertinghe near Ypres. Many of the casualties brought to the dressing station succumbed to their injuries and were then buried in a small cemetery nearby, their graves marked with a simple wooden cross and, between the crosses, the red Flanders Poppy grew in profusion.

One evening, taking a rest from his medical duties, Colonel McRae sat on a step looking out over the cemetery and was inspired to write a poem, the first verse of which was this;

In Flanders fields the poppies blow,

Between the crosses, row on row,

That mark our place, and in the sky,

The larks still bravely singing, fly.

Scarce heard amid the guns below.

Initially, McCrae showed the poem only to his close friends but many of them urged him to submit it for publication so, in 1917 he sent it to Punch Magazine. When it was published the poem resonated with the British people, most of whom had at least one relative serving in the forces, and soon copies of it were framed and hanging in houses all over the country. The poppy had become synonymous with remembrance and McCrae became instantly famous.

Sadly, McCrae was never able to enjoy the fame his poem had brought; he died of pneumonia in January 1918. However, the link between the poppy and remembrance grew ever stronger and when, in 1921, the British Legion were looking for a way to raise money for their welfare work, the symbol they chose was the poppy. Last year over 40 million poppies were distributed all over the world. They are worn by the great and the good and by ordinary people and they also make up the 1 million wreaths which are placed on war memorials all over the world.

The poppy is one of the best known symbols in our country, a symbol that reminds us of the many brave people who gave their lives in the service of our country. And it all started with a poem !

Commemorative Parade and Service to mark the Centenary of the Armistice and Return Home

St. Cuthbert's Church, Bedlington, was the centre of the town's events to mark 100 years since the end of the First World War. A decision was taken to mark the occasion in July as many of the military and ex-military personnel involved were planning to be in France and Belgium for the actual anniversary in November.

The event began with a parade down Front Street to the church, led by a pipe band and with standards flying in the glorious sunshine. The parade contained serving members of 204 (Tyneside Scottish) Battery, veterans in the Tyneside Scottish Association and army cadets from Tyneside and Bedlington.

The service included enthusiastic community singing of WWI songs, led by Ashington and District Male Voice Choir, a talk by Rev Ian Hennebry, vicar of Bedlington, on the Armistice and July 1919 peace celebrations in the town, and a moving solo "Weep you no more" by young church member Will Brown, who is also a corporal in Bedlington 2522 squadron, Bedlington ATC. There was a wonderful film presentation of a recent visit by students of Bedlington Academy to the First War battlefields, led by Mr. Andy Allman, which culminated in them taking part in the wreathlaying sunset ceremony at the Menin Gate.

The Rev. Geoffrey Driver, Padre of the Typeside Scottish Association delivered a sermon based on 1 Corinthians 13 : 1-13 and Rev Elizabeth Brown, Curate of Bedlington led the prayers. The most moving part of the service, the Act of Remembrance, followed. As a lone piper played "Flowers of the Forest", posies of flowers were laid in front of a replica 1918 grave marker by Wansbeck MP Ian Lavery, Col. Glenton, President of the Tyneside Scottish Association, the Civic Head of Northumberland County Council, Jeff Watson, Mayor of West Bedlington, Christine Taylor, representatives of army cadets, air cadets and four local schools and Mrs. Jean Carrick, representing St.

Cuthbert's. Peter Dodds of the Tyneside Scottish Association spoke the words of "For the Fallen" before a trio of buglers then marked the start and end of a minute's silence.

The service ended with Rev Driver leading the congregation in the Commitment to Peace before the pipe band led out the standards to the strains of "Highland Cathedral".

Everyone stayed behind afterwards to partake of refreshments in the church's community space, which was bedecked with bunting and flags. There was an opportunity to look at displays of work on the Armistice by students of Whitley memorial C of E First School, Bedlington Station Primary, Meadowdale Academy and Bedlington Academy and to share in a specially commissioned cake!

St Cuthbert's is grateful for the support they have had from West Bedlington Town Council (especially Mayor Christine Taylor), Northumberland County Council (especially Jackie Roll) and the Tyneside Scottish Association, in organising not only this event, but previous centenary events in 2016 and 2014.

English Schools is a national competition for the elite of the country where counties compete against each other. This year I was chosen by Northumberland Schools Athletics Association to be part of their team and compete in Birmingham at the beginning of July.

I managed to get through to the semi-finals and was proud of my achievement. I ended up ranking 16th in the UK for under 15 girls 75m hurdles.

Thank you to West Bedlington Town Council for helping me with funding to be able to go to Birmingham to represent Bedlington.

This summer has been busy with competitions and at the Northern Counties championships in Liverpool, I won a bronze medal. A week later I travelled up to Aberdeen and won a silver medal at the Scottish National Outdoor Championships. At the end of September I am moving to the U17 age category and I am hoping to get through to English Schools 2019.

Again another 6 months has passed and anyone reading my monthly blogs will know just what a bumpy ride it's been.

We see the new apartments development on the site of the old school and whilst I might have preferred the old buildings renovated for modern day usage the fact that all these new apartments have been let shows that they do satisfy a local need.

We have also seen the main contractor appointed to the Town centre redevelopment at last and I would expect work to start almost immediately.

There are some things on the horizon which will affect our role in the county, notably the Devolution deal with Newcastle and North Tyneside and the Borderlands deal which is going through central Government scrutiny as I write. I will make every effort to gain maximum benefits for our Town and its environs within both these initiatives.

Lots still to do of course but I do think Bedlington is not now being ignored as has been the case for decades and our arguments are now being taken seriously at every level!

The future development of Bedlington: the chance to have your say!

The Town Council has taken the decision to produce a Neighbourhood Plan to cover the period 2020 - 2040 to complement the Local Plan currently being developed by the County Council.

The adoption of a Neighbourhood Plan will provide the opportunity for the residents of West Bedlington to help shape the future development of our community by providing a uniquely local perspective. By means of a Neighbourhood Plan we can seek to retain and enhance those features of West Bedlington currently felt to be good whilst providing a framework for improving those aspects currently less well regarded.

The process of developing a Neighbourhood Plan requires

extensive consultation and this will take place over coming months. It will take various forms, for example, questionnaires, discussion panels with residents and stakeholders and consultation on a draft Plan. Finally residents will be invited to vote on whether to accept the final document.

During this time things will not stand still. For example work on the new Town Centre development has started and on completion, will transform the Town Centre environment and our local shopping experience. But there are many other aspects of our community that impinge on the daily lives of residents that might be improved through change.

It is clearly important when developing any plan that seeks to manage change within a community that it reflects the views of those who live and work there. As a first step therefore, the Town Council is inviting all residents and other interested parties, including local interest groups, to record their initial views of West Bedlington, the good, the bad and the downright ugly using the form enclosed with this Newsletter. To aid the process we have asked for comments under a number of generic headings: Heritage; Environment; Community Well-being; the Local Economy; Transport and Transport Infrastructure; and Housing.

The form should be completed and return to the Council Office by Friday, 23 November 2018. An online version is available at westbedlington.org.uk should you prefer.

I very much hope you will take the time to participate in this planning process and I look forward to receiving your comments. In particular I'm very much looking forward to working with you to develop a vision for the future of Bedlington we can all share and a community we can be proud of.

Heritage

West Bedlington has a proud heritage with past links to the iron industry, mining and the railways. An appreciation of our heritage gives us all a sense of place, a sense of belonging and helps to develop a cohesive society.

We have sought to highlight our history through our 'gateway' features but could we/should we do more? Please share your views below.

Environment

West Bedlington residents enjoy multiple opportunities to experience the natural environment. We are blessed to have in our small Town such wonderful facilities as Attlee Park, Plessey Woods Country Park, Dr Pit Park and Humford Woods, as well as a significant number of designated open spaces.

Whilst not all are under the control of the Town Council we would nevertheless welcome suggestions as to how these spaces and others might be developed in order that they might be improved and/or enjoyed by a wider cross section of our community. Any thoughts?

Community Well-being

The Town Council is committed to using both its resources and its influence to improving the well-being of residents. This can and does take many forms: from providing youth activities for younger members of society to supporting organisation offering cultural and sporting opportunities to their parents and grand-parents. The Town Council also organises a number of community events including the Bedlington Picnic and the August Street Fair. Just as important is ensuring that new housing developments are accompanied by appropriate adjustments to the Town's infrastructure, including health services and leisure facilities.

The Town Council has already identified a need for dedicated leisure facilities but are there other improvements you would like to see?

The Local Economy

Increasingly West Bedlington residents find that they need to commute outside of the Town for work. Whilst development of the Town Centre will provide additional employment opportunities, of itself it is unlikely to make a significant difference to the current imbalance.

Do you feel there is a need to develop wider employment opportunities within the Town or would that potentially impact adversely on the environment? How might we achieve a desirable balance?

Transport and Transport Infrastructure

West Bedlington currently enjoys a regular bus service with Newcastle and Cramlington to the South, Morpeth to the North and both Blyth and Ashington to the East. Other services provide access to local hospitals and to South Tyneside. Looking to the future, there is the possibility of rail services to Newcastle with links beyond. Whilst some congestion is experienced in the vicinity of the Red Lion roundabout, traffic is generally free-flowing. The proposed Town Centre redevelopment will include significant car parking to complement that behind Front Street West, though time will tell if it is sufficient.

Having regard to all these factors, do you feel there are further issues the Town Council should address in the proposed Neighbourhood Plan?

Housing

West Bedlington has seen significant house building over recent years with further development to come if, as seems likely, sites currently with outline planning permission get full approval. However all currently identified sites are likely to be fully developed by circa 2030 which leaves open the question of whether some further development during the years to 2040 might be desirable.

If so, should such development focus on starter homes, social housing or accommodation more suited to our increasingly elderly population? Your thoughts would be welcome.

Additional comments



The Council has been approached by a number of residents and asked to consider providing a Skate Park within the town.

The Council would be pleased to receive your comments and suggestions either for or against the provision of a Skate Park. We would also welcome suggestions in relation to suitable locations for any Skate Park and importantly, an indication if you or someone you know will use the Skate Park, if one was provided.

The Council would like to gauge the demand and estimate the potential usage of such a facility within the Town.

Environmental Enforcement Officer for West Bedlington

With effect from 1st October 2018 the Council has agreed to fund an Environment Enforcement Officer for West Bedlington. This exciting new project is a joint initiative with Northumberland County Council, Seaton Valley Community Council and Lynemouth Parish Council.

The environmental enforcement officer will be employed by Northumberland County Council directly with the costs of the position been shared between the three town/parish/ community councils pro rata.

The officer will carry out investigation, surveillance, patrolling

and enforcement in the following areas through reactive and proactive work activity:

- Dog Fouling, Other dog control issues enforceable under Northumberland County Councils Dog Control Public Spaces Protection Order
- Littering, Fly Tipping and Abandoned Vehicles.

Initially the project will be for one year with an option to renew on an annual basis.

The Council very much hopes that the presence of the Environmental Enforcement Officer will help to greatly reduce some of the environmental issues we have experiences in the town.

Local fundraiser urges people of Bedlington to help him Sponsor an RNIB Talking Book

A Bedlington man has pledged to help people with sight loss enjoy books – by raising funds to make brand new titles for RNIB's Talking Books Service.

Kevin Mulhall, whose mother lost her sight, is already an enthusiastic volunteer for RNIB, holding regular bucket collections in his local supermarkets. He has raised an incredible £24,000 in his eleven years of volunteering for the sight loss charity so far. Now he has set himself an ambitious new fundraising target of £4,000, which will provide two new Talking Books for RNIB's much loved Talking Books library – and he's hoping local people will be inspired to help.

There are over 11,000 people living with sight loss in Northumberland, and over two million in the UK as a whole.

For over 80 years, the Royal National Institute of Blind People's (RNIB) Talking Books service has helped create a lifeline for blind and partially sighted people, keeping them connected to the outside world. More than one million audiobooks are sent out free of charge to customers every year. But they are expensive to make, due to the studio time they require – an average book takes around 16 hours to record.

So now the charity is aiming to add more new titles to its library by asking people to Sponsor a Talking Book.

"£4,000 is what we need to add two brand new Talking Books to our library – one adult book and one child's," says Kevin, who plans to hold more bucket collections, and involve local individuals, organisations and businesses in lots of different fundraising activities to reach his target.



Salvation Army Summer School

Another Youth Leisure provision funded by West Bedlington Town Council.

Our Summer Club this year was a little bit different to events we have previously offered. While only one week it was a full programme of indoor games, outdoor games, crafts, circus skills, songs and bible teaching.

The week for children over 6 and under 12 years old was fully subscribed with our maximum of 40 children each day. Each day finished off with lunch for all the children before they were collected.

Fish fingers, sausages, burgers, bolognaise and a buffet over the five days with ice cream each day covered in enough raspberry sauce to fill a lake.

Half way through each morning the children all stopped for a snack and a drink. We are very grateful to Morrisons who supplied crisps, chocolate biscuits, bananas and squash for the whole week and their Community Champion Stacey who came along and volunteered her time with us. The finale to the week was a circus workshop on Sunday afternoon from 2pm until 5pm.

Dan Brown from Circus Central was with us and 30 of the children and they all had great fun doing balancing tricks, spinning plates, flower stick tricks and walking the tight wire (something none of the adults dared do!).

Having learned all their new skills the children demonstrated all they had learned all week in an evening celebration that included our church members and all the parents.

We are very grateful to West Bedlington Town Council who gave us a grant of £600 to cover the shortfall between the minimal charge we make for each child and the outlay to cover the weeks food, crafts and activities.

As always, we tried to spend it wisely on games and equipment that are sustainable and will be used for many events and summers to come.

Many of the items we bought will go on to be used in our DV8 Youth Club which is every other Friday from 6pm until 7.30pm for 6 to 12 year olds (please call for places (£1 per child)) or as part of Messy Church which takes place on the last Friday of each month.

Messy Church is a family evening which starts at 6pm with crafts, bible stories and songs and ends with everyone sharing a meal. There is no charge for Messy Church, please feel free to come and join us as a family.

At the start of the new term in September we will be reintroducing Family Film Club on the 'vacant' Friday evening. The first film will be Early Man at 5.30pm on Friday 14th September. Again, we are grateful to West Bedlington Town Council who have paid to have our cinema equipment updated and for the purchase of the first six films to get the ball rolling.

There will be no charge for entry to films, but we never refuse a donation!

Wherever we do have to charge for activities the cost is kept to a minimum in order to keep the programme running, but no profit is made.

COMMUNITY CHEST GRANTS

West Bedlington Town Council has a 'Community Chest' scheme which gives local voluntary groups and organisations a chance to bid for funding.

This might be to help establish a new group or to carry out extra activities that they wouldn't otherwise be able to do – e.g. sporting activities, arts, music or craft group, new equipment for a youth club – but these ideas will be coming from the community themselves.

To qualify for an award the applicant must be able to demonstrate clearly that any funding from West Bedlington Town Council will benefit the Town, or residents of the Town.

Grant applications will be dealt with by the Full Council. In determining the validity of an application, the Council will refer to the following guidelines:

Applications will be considered for the following purposes: -

- 1. For the purpose of purchasing equipment or materials either in part or in full.
- 2. For the purchase of services e.g. venue hire or transport that will enable group members to partake in a group trip or outing regardless of their incomes.
- 3. For running costs (but not wages) of a viable group that is experiencing a period of hardship.
- 4. For the provision of recreational activities and facilities.
- 5. For activities that raise the profile of the area.
