Hello and welcome



The Salvation Army in Bedlington is a great support to the local community, offering everything from a foodbank service to lunch for the over 60s, and so much more.

The funding from West Bedlington Town Council was used to host a civic reception in summer 2025 to welcome the Canadian Staff Songsters to Bedlington. The Songsters visited St Cuthbert's for a talk about the history of the church and the town, then after the reception, they performed at The Salvation Army in Bedlington to an audience of over 200 people.

Wansbeck Community Links

Wansbeck Community Links is a team of social-prescribing link workers, employed by Cygnus, a local counselling charity.

The team offer general advice and link people into voluntary and community groups and services to

get the practical, emotional and social support needed to help.

The funding provided from West Bedlington Town Council has helped to provide transport for some of the older attendees who have poor mobility, so that they can still get out and socialise.

Bedlington Cricket Club Juniors

Bedlington Cricket Club Juniors is a thriving community club, providing cricket opportunities for

children aged five to fifteen, with over fifty juniors currently training and competing in local leagues and festivals.

Our junior programme also includes ECB All Stars and Dynamos sessions, which help introduce younger children to the sport and create a pathway into competitive cricket.

The funding provided from West Bedlington Town Council has been used to purchase new junior match and training shirts, as well as replacing protective equipment for players who do not yet have their own.

The support means that all children can participate safely and proudly represent Bedlington, regardless of family income, helping to promote healthy, active lifestyles and a strong sense of community pride.



Toys, Snacks and Chats Playgroup

Having a safe, engaging environment for little ones to play while grown-ups can chat is such an important part of the week for many parents, grandparents and carers.

The parent and child playgroup – Toys, Snack and Chats – runs from 9.30am to 11.30am every Thursday in term time at Bedlington Community Centre, and the funding provided will help with the weekly costs associated with running such a worthwhile group.

Bedlington Foodbank

Bedlington Foodbank is a charitable, voluntary-run organisation that supplies emergency food parcels in the community.

The funding from West Bedlington Town Council's Community Chest scheme was used to purchase food-bank items to support the not-for-profit organisation.

Everyone's welcome

at our monthly meetings

Everyone's welcome to attend our regular monthly meetings, where councillors get together to make informed decisions about projects and spending, as well as discussing general Town Council business.

It's ok if you're washing your hair that day, but if you're interested in popping along, the meetings usually take place on the second Thursday of the month at 6.30pm in Bedlington Community Centre.

All meetings are subject to change; however, provisional dates for the next six months are as follows: 13th November; 11th December; 8th January; 12th February; 12th March; 9th April.

At the start of each meeting, there's a fifteenminute open session where the Chair will invite
members of the public to ask agenda-related
questions directly to West Bedlington Town Council.
We're always interested in hearing your views and
comments, but once the question-and-answer
session ends and the Town Council meeting
commences, the public are politely requested just
to observe so we can conduct our business, unless
specifically requested by the Chair to speak. There is
an opportunity to ask questions which are not
related to the agenda at the end of the meeting too.

Mobile phones must be switched off during the meeting, and if the meeting is disrupted in any way, the person/people causing the disruption will be

asked to stop, and if they refuse, asked to leave. Written questions received in advance of the meeting are encouraged, but not essential. If provided in advance, it's easier for an answer to be prepared for the meeting.

West Bedlington Town Council can only make decisions on topics that are publicised on the agenda, except items delegated to the Clerk. Agenda items may be suggested via email – clerk@ westbedlingtontowncouncil.gov.uk – no later than ten days before each meeting, otherwise the item will be included on a future agenda (if it's a matter that we're responsible for).

You can view meeting agendas and minutes on our website, westbedlingtontowncouncil.gov.uk, and they will also be displayed on the noticeboard in front of Bedlington Community Centre. If you would like our meeting agendas emailed once a month, please get in touch and we'll add you to our mailing list.

We hope to see you at a West Bedlington Town Council meeting or event in the not-too-distant future.

Dogs in these classes are judged against others of



the same breed and gender, and successful participation can lead to qualification for Crufts. At the event, Ciara showed Alfie to the judges; showcasing his conformation and movement as she walked him around the ring.

Ciara's grandma has five cairn terriers and has bred dogs for over 20 years. When the judges placed Alfie first, she said "I felt very proud. My grandma said I did a very good job".


Thanks for your feedback



parking issues, housing, Council Tax, providing a leisure centre, etc. So, the answers from this survey* are related to the services we provide, not Northumberland County Council.


Q. When you contacted West Bedlington Town Council by phone, email or in person, how did you feel about this interaction?




Q. Thinking about the services and events that we provide and that you have used/ attended, which of the following five options best sums up your feelings?




Q. How well informed do you think the Town Council keeps residents about the services, facilities and benefits it provides?






Q. Do you know that you pay for the services provided by West Bedlington Town Council through your Council Tax bill?




Q. Would a monthly drop-in session be something you'd be interested in, so you could chat to a councillor at a specific time and place?

Your town council, here for you

Here at West Bedlington Town Council, we work hard to safeguard Bedlington's past, present and future to ensure the town continues to be a great place to live, work and visit, whilst preserving Bedlington's rich heritage.

West Bedlington Town Council employs two part-time members of staff to support residents and councillors (we aren't a huge team like Northumberland County Council). We have nine voluntary, unpaid councillors, representing two electoral wards – Bedlington Central and Bedlington West – who help to inform decisions about local services and contribute to the overall wellbeing of our community.

Our services include the provision of:

- Children's play areas (Meadowdale, 20 Acres, Westlea not Doctor Pit Park)
- Bus shelters
- Litter bins (we provide them, but Northumberland County Council empty them)
- Public seating
- Events for the whole community, including

school-holiday activities, music festival on 20 Acres, Christmas lights switch-on event, Remembrance Sunday, etc

- Community grants
- Grants for primary schools
- Community CCTV
- Community defibrillators
- Planters and flowers on the Front Street (not the bedding plants)
- War memorial and flagpole maintenance
- Christmas tree and lights
- Christmas and Easter gifts for primary schools
- Town gateway features (for example, the train sign at Atlee Park and the Bedlington terrier sign on Hartford Road East)
- Road speed-awareness signs (maintenance only, not their provision)
- Sun dial in the Market Place

All other local council services, for example, housing, refuse collection, Council Tax and housing benefits are the responsibility of Northumberland County Council. You can report all sorts of issues, from fly tipping to street lighting at fix.northumberland.gov.uk or by calling 0345 600 6400.
