Forward by the Mayor



Well it's been an interesting time since our last newsletter. As well as introducing a corporate colour scheme and logo we will soon see our new gateway features (subject to planning!) and have a new media package for council in place. We have also had a Dog Show, Street Fair, Brass Band Concert, Xmas light switch on event as well as the whole Tesco/Arch/NCC reveal. On top of that we have put a new budget into place and taken up the offer of a potential site for a new sports development.

Let's look at those in a bit more detail.

First of all putting council into a workable structure has taken several months but finally we have something fit for purpose and which can now deliver significant savings, be cost effective and deliver quality services on behalf of residents. Aligned with this year's budget the foundations are now in place to enable this council to drive progress in our Town and that's not just events these days!

Speaking of events, the Street Fair we pulled off last year was a huge success, thanks to Paul Taylor and John Houghton for their help. It resulted in more positive comments coming back into council than anything which has taken place before and it's something we obviously want to replicate. However because of the Tesco redevelopment we are not going to be able to use the same site and the footprint of our street fair this year will look very different. Hopefully we will still be putting on a quality event on for residents and visitors alike.

The Xmas light switch on event was very professional and a great time was

reported by all. This time thanks go to Leah Bell and her "elves". Determined to have one of the best Xmas trees in the area we bought a larger tree and new lighting garlands. Our Xmas tree and its lighting did look very impressive until some mindless yobs decided to rip off half the lights! Are some people just determined to live in squalor? It certainly shows the level of intelligence we have to deal with sometimes! We are now seeing vandalism at the Attlee and Plessey Woods Country Parks...why?

(BTW, Council now has a 'Zero Tolerance' policy in place... if we find anyone vandalising our community owned assets we will prosecute to the full extent of the law and seek punitive damages!)

The dog show and brass band concert were events council wanted to try and I will be first to hold my hand up and say they were not advertised as well as we hoped. Mainly because our last newsletter had to be postponed so when it finally went out the dog show had already just taken place! It was still quite a success with the dog owners who turned up. Thanks go to Bedlington Terrier owner and

Crufts winner Craig Richardson for his invaluable help and advice. Also many thanks to the Northumberland Brass Band Association, especially Tony Griffiths for all his help and to the event sponsor Mr Ken Beattie of the Techflow Group.

Getting down to the nitty gritty now and the main reasons we have decided to publish two newsletters a year, one in spring to tell everyone about summer events and explain our budget and one in Autumn recalling how the summer events went and making sure we are on track with our budget.

As I explained at the time, the budget this year has been challenging, not because of constraints but because of the ambitious nature many of us wanted to see included. To set council on a sensible track for next year and beyond we had to get all of our core assets into the best shape we could and most were in pretty dire need because of years of underinvestment. So we agreed a budget which will renew or update all of our bus shelters, renew all of our children's play equipment in the parks we are responsible for, and bring in

a rationalisation programme for litter bins and street furniture.

This made this year's budget requirement the largest but most prudent this council had ever set with around £250.000 worth of new purchases but one which required a pretty small increase in the precept. Most people, band "A", will pay around 13p a week extra, band "D" 20p a week extra, and remember this is only for one year so whilst the upgrades will last 10/15/20 years we will pay for them all this year! That sets council on a proper path for future budgets and if properly addressed and accounted for over the few next years the money should be there for future upgrades without the need of an increase, it's called budgeting for a reason!

The Main Points:

- WBTC Precept...+16% giving us a precept total of £214K.
- We have cut £50K out of last year's budget and actually maintained all service deliveries in real terms by renegotiating contracts, shrewd forward planning and competitive tendering.
- With Steven's help (our Clerk) we have reduced the core costs of council by over 10%.
- Member's expenses, including training and the Annual Town meeting have been reduced by about 25%. Only one member has claimed any expenses since last May and he was perfectly entitled to do so.
- We have taken around half the costs of the new bus shelters and play equipment out of reserves BUT we will be applying for funding for them as well. The total cost of these replacements alone is in the order of £200K.
- We renegotiated our SLA with NCC and capped the cost for 2 years.
- We are rationalising NCC service deliveries to make them more cost effective.
- We still want events on in the Town and they have been allowed for. However I am keen to see

that as seed funding and we need to replicate last year's events management and drive income from them, so we can do even more.

- Xmas lights and switch on event will still happen and we hope to see Xmas lights down Glebe Road for the first time ever!
- Still supporting Bedlington in Bloom and our entry into the Northumberland in Bloom awards scheme.
- Still supporting voluntary groups and worthwhile causes.
- Still maintaining support for schools and our young people.

In previous years the costs of having a Town Council cost you approximately 80% of what you were paying in as a precept with only 20% actually being spent on delivering services into the town. That was utter madness in my view and something I was determined to change. Going through the costs of the council and rationalising them with our clerk enables us to put more into service deliveries, which means we are now looking at a much healthier 40/60 split with 40% of costs going into running the council. That's impressive and already beats the national average of 60/40, but if we factor in the new purchases and their cost in this year's budget we see that relationship down to 24/76! That's 24% of what you pay in now goes towards the cost of running this council and its purchases and with that everyone will understand when I say this Town council is now offering the very best value for money for ratepayers probably in the North East region!

So an ambitious budget but we weren't finished there. We had been offered an option on a parcel of land by Mr A. Rutherford who farms the land at the west of our area. It was a very generous offer and one which was eagerly taken up because it might finally address one of the biggest issues this Town has had over the last 50 years, the lack of a dedicated Bedlington community sports facility. My personal wish is for "Sporting Club Bedlington" with a multi-use adaptable facility and playing fields around the outside. I am firmly convinced we

potentially have 'Olympic' quality athletes within Bedlington who have never played the sport they might well excel in. We need to give them that chance.

There are no promises and it's going to take a lot of hard work to pull this off but there is a team being pulled together to lead on this and it won't fail because of a lack of commitment or effort! We do need your help and we need everyone to be honest. We need to know what sort of facilities people want to see but especially what facilities they will support and use, and that means pay to use! See this later section and please send in your thoughts and needs, we will need them for funding applications because this will be a Bedlington project and Bedlington will own it! Make no mistake, to succeed here is down to us, every one of us, there is no help forthcoming from anywhere, we are going to have to do this for ourselves!

Remembrance Day and once again a very well attended poignant and evocative service, held commemorating our past "Fallen". Many thanks to all who helped organise this emotional annual event, especially Councillor Graham who oversaw our contribution.

On a happier note I also want to mention our Youth Council and its youngest members. I have been so very impressed by their commitment and determination and the way they have been exceptional ambassadors for their respective schools. I would like to take this opportunity to say thank you to each one of you for all your hard work and it's been a real pleasure to work with you. Thanks Ryan Fisher, Charlotte Standring, Emily Gair, Lewis Cochrane, Lily Donaldson, Georgia Dunn, Katie Thornton, Aiden Forrest, Hannah Lott and Sam Livingstone, your contribution has been first class!

Finally the Tesco redevelopment.

Hopefully we have all seen and commented on the designs for the Tesco site redevelopment. First let me thank all the community representatives who gave up their time to attend meetings and presentations,

Russ, John and Brian and not forgetting our delegate too, Adam! Let's hope the decision makers take on-board all and everything we have told them through our comments both face to face and in the written replies to this consultation exercise.

The final presentation gave us two architectural practices and their designs, one with a single design the other with two designs.

I can't really comment on what my personal choice was but I would like to reply personally to the many people who voiced their opinion that housing should not be included in this development.

Firstly and probably most importantly is that put simply this is not a funded development, it has to find its own financial backing! Now we can shout that other Towns have been handed their regeneration funding on a plate and why does ours have to fund itself, well that's a question I can't answer that's a question for NCC and Arch they claim to be backing redevelopment in all the principle Market Towns in our county, of which Bedlington is one! The simple fact remains however that the housing requirement is part of that self-funding package and has to be included to get this scheme off the ground!

Leaving that to one side another very important part of this particular jigsaw is the retail offer and what retailers will demand before they come and invest time and money into Bedlington. That may well produce significant differences to what we have been looking at given the commercial reality

which has to be mixed in too.

So all in all a very organic development and one which will inevitably change and evolve through time. It's a complex and somewhat multifaceted development for the reasons stated above (and others) and requires a certain level of professionalism and if I may say emotional detachment, which I believe Arch does offer. I am certainly willing to give them the support needed to see this huge inward investment come into Bedlington!

If this does happen it will inexorably change and shape Bedlington for the next 50 years. Let's get it right this time!

To clarify the Town Council's position, after a very open debate we have agreed the following as being representative of what we, as a council, are promoting for this redevelopment..... "a youth facility, public conveniences, leisure use, retail use, a community space, a public mall or exhibition area, specific retail units that would encourage businesses on the fringes of the town to relocate into the proposed development and car parking (the Council would like to see as much car parking provision retained as possible)".

Speaking of public conveniences, the council like many of our residents are less than happy about the fact that NCC decided to close all of our public loos in one of their cost cutting programmes. We examined the one next to the library but found it was a wholly uneconomical repair due to the adjacent trees and their roots, the one in the old Tesco car park was

going to be demolished and the land there built on which left us with only one realistically to look at, the one in Attlee Park. We decided because of the huge cost in hiring in loos for any events down in the park and the fact that this park was becoming more and more used, thanks in no small measure to our new safe pathway, that we would explore the option of refurbishing these public loos. We now have planning permission for this refurbishment and are currently awaiting building regs, and then we can get some firm costings. I hope to be able to bring some good news about this development and some fantastic financial support soon!

In closing, Bedlington now has a Town Council willing to invest in its infrastructure, its promotion and its community. We are taking that lead wherever we can and asking for your support and your understanding because things don't happen overnight. 50yrs worth of inequalities cannot be put right in a heartbeat however much we want them to. but it is starting to happen and with your help we will succeed! Is this not one of the most exciting times in our recent history? We finally stand a chance, if we get it right, of rejuvenating our main shopping street and in fact the centre of our Town, putting half a century of bitterness to one side and working on our own sporting facility, putting our stamp on the region with a combination of branding and innovative design and giving us yet more reasons to be proud Bedlingtonians!

The 2016-17 Budget:

The Budget for the Town Council is set annually and lasts for one year. We normally begin discussions and considerations before Xmas and should have something in place to send off to the County Council, who collect the 'Parish Precept', in February at the latest.

This year was no different as far as timings went but very different as far as what members wanted to see in this year's budget.

After many hours' worth of meetings we had to make a decision and that was to get our priorities and core deliveries in as good a condition as possible so next year we can look into some of the more ambitious proposals which had been suggested this year.

Look at this budget as a twofold delivery, one which gets rid of things like leaking bus shelters and broken play equipment and the other strand

but it will now all go on improving the assets we as a community and residents need as lasting town infrastructure and it's all paid for within a single year.

What we really need now is to find out exactly what residents want available within such a facility. Please remember we need to know what you will support and that means pay to use, because this has to have an extraordinary amount of sustainability built in. This

will not be an NCC owned facility run by Active Northumberland, this will be our facility run by us!

Doctor Pit Park Improvement Project

A project to put the heart back into Doctor Pit Park has begun in early 2016.

Funding to make improvements to the play area and to install a new multi-use games area has already been awarded by Northumberland County Council's Section 106 Housing Developer Funding Scheme.

Subject to more successful funding bids, further planned improvements include:

- Planting more bulbs, flowers and trees throughout the park for colour and wildlife value
- Removing overgrown conifers
- Widening the footpath through the Toddler's play area to the Gordon Terrace entrance (by the school)
- Improving footpath surfaces throughout the park
- Removing barriers by taking out the hedge by the wheeled spots area, and the fence between the two play areas

- Improving the entrances at Park Road at Gordon Terrace
- Improving the Rockery and making it a space to be explored and played on

CHURCH LAUNCHES LIFE-SAVING SERVICE FOR PEOPLE IN DEBT

PEOPLE stuck in the debt trap can now get free help thanks to a local church opening a Debt Help centre.

Hope Church Bedlington is partnering with national charity Christians Against Poverty to bring its awardwinning service to South East Northumberland. It follows the recent "What Hurts Most" survey by the church which revealed that debt and financial worries were one of the top concerns for people in the area.

The new CAP Debt Centre is available for anyone living in the Bedlington, Ashington, Morpeth, Blyth and Cramlington areas. There is no need to be religious or have a connection with the Church to benefit from the in-depth, face to face service that CAP provides.

Bedlington Centre Manager Kay
Fancett said: "The Church has always
been about offering hope and we're
really pleased to be able to give a triedand-tested route out of debt. In our
society a lot of poverty is debt-related,
so Hope Church has been working
hard to get our new CAP centre so we
can help get people back on track."

CAP offers people a uniquely in-depth, caring service to people with spiralling personal debt regardless of their age, gender, faith or background. Every client is visited in their own home, the charity does all the negotiating with creditors and local volunteers offer support to each person face-to-face

until the day they are debt free.

Statistics show that one in three callers seeking debt help are feeling suicidal but find huge relief through the nonjudgemental service that treats every person as an individual.

Kay added: "Typically, debts can build up when a relationship breaks down, or someone loses their job, or through bereavement - so often when people are least able to cope with a financial headache."

Anyone wanting help should phone 0800 328 0006. The call is answered at CAP's Bradford office and the trained staff will make an appointment for volunteers from the Bedlington centre to visit you.

This is to once again reinforce the Bedlington Town area and along with our new corporate livery present a positive, ambitious and proactive image to the world.





At the southern entrance we will see our world renowned dog the Bedlington Terrier. We firmly expect this will become THE place for dog owners to get pictures taken with their dogs.


The Northern entrance will boast a St Cuthberts Cross denoting the significance Bedlington played in the St Cuthbert story.

Commemorating the Battle of the Somme and the Bedlington Connection

At 7.30 am on the 1st July 1916, the men from the Tyneside Scottish Battalions "Went over the top" for an attack through "No Man's Land", towards the village of Contalmaison. This was the start of the Battle of the Somme.

It was to be one of the bloodiest battles of the First World War. It is difficult to get accurate numbers of casualties, but by the end of the day, it was reported that the Tyneside Scottish alone, had lost 940 men killed, with a further 1600 injured.

2016 is the centenary of that fateful day, and to mark the occasion. The "Tyneside Scottish" Branch, Royal Artillery Association, St Cuthbert's Church, and Northumberland County Council, supported by West Bedlington Town Council are to hold a parade and service of commemoration on Sunday 10th July 2016, with the service commencing at 3.00pm, to recognise the sacrifice and bravery of the men who were involved in the battle and the families who waited anxiously to hear the news of, or from their loved ones.

The commemoration, which will commence with a parade, led by a corps of Pipes and Drums down Front Street to the church. will include, veterans, serving military personal and military cadets. It will represent all ages, as a fitting memorial to those who gave their lives so bravely on that fateful day.

The Tyneside Scottish Battalions consisted of some 5000 men, a great number of whom were recruited from Bedlington and the surrounding areas. Many had been employed in the mining industry and signed up as "Pals" unit, that were men who had worked together, lived in the same street, joined up together, fought together and unfortunately died together. The Coal Companies (Bedlington and Netherton) commissioned memorial boards, with the name of 418 men. These are displayed in The Memorial Chapel in St Cuthbert's together with the "Colour" of the 2nd Battalion, which was presented on the Town Moor on 10th July 1920 and has been in the church ever since.

Asked by a couple of members of another local organisation to look into the possibility of providing a community accessible defibrillator.

West Bedlington Town Council took the decision to back not just a single unit but putting as many as possible into our Town. The protection and well-being of our residents is of paramount importance and anything which gives us more of a chance in a lifesaving situation is something the council wants to be involved with. Instead of just one being placed in our Town there will be 3 permanently available to the general public and one mobile unit carried by Bedlington Town FC.

Huge vote of thanks goes to the Bedlington Masonic Lodges and Barry Elliott and Darren Taylor from the new Baedling Court care home for sponsoring a unit each.

Soon we should see one on the Masonic building at the Top End roundabout, one on the exterior of the new care home in the middle of Town and one on the exterior of the Johnny Johnson sheltered housing, Wansbeck Court, at the bottom end of the Town. Many thanks to each one for agreeing to position one of these defibrillators on their buildings so they are truly accessible and should offer unparalleled coverage for Bedlington.

Having just been informed about the use of a defibrillator only recently at a RTA on the crossing on Glebe Bank the sooner we can get these potentially lifesaving bits of kit installed the better! Thankfully I have seen the guy who was involved in the accident and he looks back to normal to me.



Bedlington Neighbourhood Plan

The Bedlington Partnership are currently working alongside West Bedlington Town Council to create a Neighbourhood Plan for our town.

A Neighbourhood Plan gives us an opportunity to influence planning decisions in our town by creating a legal document that has to be given consideration when these decisions are being made. Although any NP will need to keep in line with points in the Northumberland Core Strategy document, it will give us much more of an opportunity to guide decisions on aspects of planning such as where the houses are located, facilities that come with housing or design and heritage features when new buildings are considered, to name a few. To create a Neighbourhood Plan is a great opportunity for local people to genuinely have our say on the future of our town!

Sadly, this document cannot be prepared overnight and has to go through a series of stages to become a legal document. The first stage, which is to create a boundary area for West Bedlington, has been done. Now a boundary is in place, policies can be drawn up for the plan in consultation with the local community. After a series of legal checks the plan can go to a local referendum for the community to decide if they want the plan to become a legal document. A straightforward majority of positive replies means that the document will have the direct power to shape development and growth of our local area.

This is our chance to make a significant difference and, unlike other consultations affecting Bedlington, this can only happen with the approval of the majority of voters.

Working to improve the Town

West Bedlington Town Council have implemented a rolling improvement programme to upgraded the Town's assets. This includes Bus Shelters, replacing lamp post mounted litter bins with floor standing bins and of course children's play equipment in Westlea and Meadowdale play areas.

Bus Shelters

Earlier this year we commenced the bus shelter refurbishment by replacing older shelters like this one near Nedderton and replacing with them with new, modern and safe shelters like this one at Red House Farm in our corporate colours of green and gold, creating a positive image for our town.

In addition we have also agreed to install two new Bus shelters at North Ridge and Ridge Villas, this is a busy bus route and residents now have a shelter to enable them to take cover when waiting for a bus.

Play Areas

We have planned a full refurbishment of all play equipment in both Westlea and Meadowdale play areas. We are keen not just to replace this equipment but to upgrade and potentially introduce more adventurous play areas to aid our children's development. It is our aim to commence these renewals later in the year when the parks are less busy which will hopefully minimise disruption for the children.

Litter Bins

We have also made a commitment to replacing most of our lamp post mounted litter bins with new floor standing bins, these are more environmentally friendly, hold more waste and are easier to use and quicker to empty, freeing up Neighbourhood Services time to provide us with additional cleaning services.



Seating

We have replaced several seats in the area and have installed several new ones, using our signature Bedlington Terrier seats in prominent places where possible. This will continue in the new financial year along with the cleaning and staining of several other seats to bring them back to life.

Our new Bus Shelters

Bus shelters are one of the physical things (assets) the Town Council has to look after. These along with certain street furniture and playground equipment are the main assets we have an 'upkeeping' responsibility over.

As most of the bus shelters in our area have been in place for many years they were requiring more and more attention and maintenance. Also a lot of them being painted black did nothing for their aspect or our civic appearance.

With years of neglect and underinvestment there was nothing for it but to commence with drastic surgery! Every one of them not up to a very good standard was condemned.

Once we had the numbers needed to be changed we then proceeded to negotiate with various suppliers, local and national, in an effort to find best value for ratepayers. One such supplier gave us that return we were looking for and indeed we negotiated extra discounts based on the quantities we would order. This brought costs per comparable unit down to around 30% of what they had been and allowed us to put in a rationalisation programme for all of our bus shelters in the financial year 2016-17.

This has been so successful other larger councils have asked us for advice regarding their own bus shelter requirements.

These costs savings not only allowed us to examine existing shelters for replacement we were also able to put new ones in places residents had been asking about for many years!

Because we also wanted to keep any rise in the precept to a minimum we were able to bring forward a limited amount of our renewal programme into the 2015-16 year as we continued to examine our working budgets and identify any underspends. That's why we saw some new shelters fitted in February and March but none more until after April and the start of the new financial year.

A couple of the shelters which were fitted early did have the wrong sides and one was fitted the wrong way around. These should now have been rectified!

Look out for our new playground equipment projects this year too!





Spring Jobs Fair

On 18th February 2016 West Bedlington Town Council along with partners DWP and JCP held our first Jobs Fair.

The event was well received and was very well attended and means we can think about doing similar again. Over 300 people came through the door looking for career opportunities.

Some of the comments received off visitors when I asked how they found the event, "I'm coming away with some new interviews."...... "I have a job offer!""Better than I expected!"......and one young woman said she now knew what "way she would be going so she now had a clear route to take."

WBTC would like to thank our partners in DWP for their diligence and hard work helping to put this event on for residents.

COMMUNITY GRANTS

West Bedlington Town
Council has a 'Community
Chest' scheme which gives
local voluntary groups and
organisations a chance to bid
for funding.

This might be to help establish a new group or to carry out extra activities that they wouldn't otherwise be able to do - e.g. sporting activities, arts, music or craft group, new equipment for a youth club - but these ideas will be coming from the community themselves.

To qualify for an award the applicant must be able to demonstrate clearly that any funding from West Bedlington Town Council will benefit the Town, or residents of the Town.

Grant applications will be dealt with by the Full Council. In determining the validity of an application, the Council will refer to the following quidelines:

Applications will be considered for the following purposes:

- For the purpose of purchasing equipment or materials either in part or in full.
- For the purchase of services e.g. venue hire or transport that will enable group members to partake in a group trip or outing regardless of their incomes.
- For running costs (but not wages) of a viable group that is experiencing a period of hardship.
- For the provision of recreational activities and facilities.
- For activities that raise the profile of the area.

There is £5,000 available for community grants in the current financial year.

Dear Mayor,

Less than a year after the appalling attacks of this past January, Paris is again bathed in blood by an outburst of bestial violence devoid of the slightest hint of human feeling - a violence that reflects the hatred of life and the detestation of freedom.

On Friday evening it is in neighbourhoods where all generations, all languages, all cultures are coexisting that the terrorists tried to impose silence through weapons.

In order to show her solidarity with the victims and her total condemnation of these horrendous acts, Anne HIDALGO convened the Paris Council on Monday morning to allow Paris elected representatives to render a solemn homage to the victims and to join together in the defence of democracy in the face of barbarity.

Plessey Woods Country
Park is a beautiful and

drew thousands of more
people from Newcastle
and beyond to see the new
Plessey Woods Art Trail.

The young people from Leading Link together with professional artists have been working since the Summer of 2015 to create permanent art installations within a one-mile trail.


The installations include Enchanted Hollow, Quarry Henge, Bog House Swamp, Mystical Avenue, OXO, Marra and his Bone, Cherokee Whee, Why Eye, Wood U Play and The Wise One.

In addition to the main art installations there are owls pointing the way around the trail using their wings and many animals and snakes that have been created by the young people are hidden in the trees.

The whole project, a partnership between Leading Link and Northumberland County Council, has been funded by Sita Trust to enable the young people to put their community project into action and the Foyer Federation have been running a Project Management course alongside to give them the added skill and recognition via certificates for all their hard work. The young people have learned lifelong skills such as event management, willow weaving, wood carving, budgeting, time planning and team work.

Northumberland County Councillor, Valerie Tyler and Kath Nisbet, the County Councils Civic Head officially opened the art trail on 2nd April 2016. Leading Link and the young people organised family activities to make the event a great day out for all the family. Despite the rain and the mud, over a thousand still turned out and again the following day.

Due to the overwhelming interest in the lantern parades an additional two



more were added over the holidays and were very well received with people saying it was magical to see the trail in this way. Over the year, there will be more opportunities to experience this.

John Percival from the Foyer Federation said, "Staff and young people from Leading Link should be immensely proud of what they have achieved with this project. Hundreds of young people have been engaged throughout the process from the initial idea right through to installation of their piece. The results are an amazing creative space and resource for the local community to use for many years to come. This is another example of young people showing what talent they have and why we should continuing to invest in young people in the future"

Bedlington has a great new tourist attraction on their doorstep and the council and Leading Link hope that the trail will continue to be added to over the years. Already there is a chance for the community to 'make their mark in the park' as the public are being invited to paint their own rounded cobble stone (approximately 9cm big) and drop it into the Lodge before May 15th. These stones will then become part of 'Cobbled Avenue', the fourteenth art installation within the trail.

The art installations are permanent and can be seen anytime and most can be seen from the bridle paths for disabled access.
